



Study Committee Reports

House Study Committee on the State Board of Registration of Used Motor Vehicle Dealers and Used Motor Vehicle Parts Dealers

The committee was created to address fraud and enforcement gaps related to dealer tags and temporary vehicle registrations in the used motor vehicle industry. Because counties lose Title Ad Valorem Tax (TAVT) revenue when dealer plates are used indefinitely to avoid taxation, the committee recommended a "3-6-9 rule" requiring dealers to document that a vehicle remains legitimately for sale after three and six months, and to title the vehicle and pay TAVT after nine months. The committee also recommended shifting primary enforcement authority to the Department of Revenue due to insufficient inspection staff and called for improved temporary tag design and better law enforcement coordination to help local agencies identify fraudulent vehicles.

House Study Committee on Funding for Next Generation 9-1-1

This study committee conducted a comprehensive review of the state's current 9-1-1 funding provisions and identified any reforms necessary to provide adequate funding to support the transition from legacy 9-1-1 centers to modern Next Generation 9-1-1 centers in a manner that will ensure that their current and future operations can be fully realized in Georgia.

Senate Study Committee on Making Georgia the No. 1 State for Tourism

In its review of Georgia's tourism policy, the Senate Study Committee emphasized shifting more tourism-related tax burdens from residents to visitors by reaffirming the 3% unrestricted local hotel-motel tax framework and recommending clearer collection requirements. The committee also noted the central role counties play in tourism infrastructure, workforce development, and convention facilities, and recommended that future state investments coordinate with counties rather than bypassing local decision-making.

House Blue Ribbon Study Committee on Election Procedures

The study committee, tasked with reviewing the current state of elections in Georgia, concluded its final meeting on Oct. 16, 2025, in Sumter County. The committee examined voter list maintenance, voting administrative procedures, voting technology, and the role of the State Election Board to recommend legislative changes to the General Assembly. Although the committee has not yet issued a final report, it has not been disbanded.

House Blue Ribbon Study Committee on Insurance Rates

The study committee held its fourth hearing on Dec. 18, 2025, for a continued examination of the insurance industry's rate-setting practices, profit margins, claims processing and regulatory compliance, uninsured motorist coverage, and insurance fraud. The goal of the study committee is to ensure that Georgians are not subjected to unjustified insurance rate hikes.

Currently, the Blue Ribbon Study Committee has not issued final recommendations or a final committee report.

Senate Special Committee on Eliminating Georgia's Income Tax Issues Final Report

During the Senate Special Committee's final meeting on Jan. 7, they adopted their final report with recommendations that include eliminating Georgia state income tax on the first \$50,000 in income for individuals and \$100,000 for joint filers. The special committee recommends that these changes go into effect by next year. No committee recommendations issued in the final report would impact local government revenues.
